THE GREEN GRAPEVINE

Hearing from people who have read something in the Green Grapevine that they can use to make a change is their environmental footprint is great. Whether the changes are big or small, every change makes a difference.

This month you can also make a difference far beyond your own recycle bin by participating in the City of Ottawa newly launched engagement on the plans for waste management. https://engage.ottawa.ca/solid-waste-master-plan.

Since 2019, The City of Ottawa has been pursuing a **Solid Waste Master Plan**. Last year they held consultations on curbside garbage collections and are using much of what they have learned in these consultations to put together a Phase 2 report.

One element of the new engagement is a survey looking at a wide range of priority topics, including organics collection in multi residential properties. Trying to get green bin collection in apartments has been a source of frustration for many residents so it is encouraging to see it on the list for exploration. Other topics include turning waste into renewable energy, new and creative ways to reduce and reuse waste, how we manage garbage and recycling in parks, and education opportunities. The survey will be open until **Sunday May 8, 2022**.

There are also public virtual events targeting number of different areas. For example, March 28 looks at prioritizing implementation of programs related to reusing, reducing, recycling, and expanding the **Take It Back Program.** On Tuesday May 3 the topic is "**Let's Talk Waste Plan Options on Multi-Residential Properties**" exploring increasing Green Bin participation.

The City of Ottawa is also looking for volunteers for smaller focus groups being held for young people, older adults, racialized residents, new immigrants, and members of the 2SLGBTQQIA+ community who would like an opportunity to discuss options and the way forward.

March 2, 2022 At the United Nations Environment Assembly (UNEP 5.2) meeting in Nairobi, UN member states unanimously agreed to start negotiations for the first ever, legally binding global treaty on plastic pollution. Recognized as an historic beginning, treaty content is targeted to be finalized in 2024 with the goal to rein in soaring and disastrous plastic pollution.

Rebecca Prince-Ruiz, (Founder & Executive Director of the Plastic Free Foundation) writes from the UN meeting "This is a victory for every single person who has taken action to reduce plastic waste in their own lives ... This will hold all nations, businesses and society accountable in ending plastic pollution in the environment".

Andrée Anderson, (née Savoie)

A tribute by Susan Russell

Andrée, a long-time club member, made a unique contribution to the Club. With Ann Tomlinson, she designed the CFUW Nepean banner and she led the way in establishing the CFUW Nepean Scholarship Fund. She leaves a unique legacy.

Andrée died peacefully of natural causes on February 16th,2022. Although she had Parkinson's disease for more than 15 years she retained her strength, patience, and determination to fully enjoy and partake of life.

Andrée is deeply mourned by her family. Her husband Francis and her son John both died last May. She leaves behind many friends from the Wrens, CFUW, the Redwoods, and St Patrick's Home.

Andrée was born in 1926 in Plessisville Quebec, part of a long line of Savoie and Huard ancestors. She earned her first of several degrees from Université de Laval. She started her career at Quebec Hydro, and then served as an Officer in the Women's Royal Canadian Naval Service (Wrens), including an appointment as the Aide to the Admiral at HMCS Stadacona in Halifax. She made many life-long friends amongst her fellow Wrens. She also enjoyed having meals and socializing at the Officer's Mess, including with one officer who caught her eye by the name of Francis. They were married for over 60 years. After marrying, she devoted herself full time to raising her family. She was fluently bilingual and for her final career, she became a Professor of French language and finally taught English as a second language (ESL).

Throughout her life she was an avid reader, gracious in conversation, keenly interested in current events and the human stories behind the people that she met. Attention to detail and style were her hallmarks She always remembered to thank people.
